HOW ARE YOU?

Busy, but happy doing what I love doing.

WHAT LED YOU INTO INTERIOR DESIGN?

Art College at 16, then work for a lot of years in unrelated fields. Then the realisation to return to creative work, retraining, lots of hard work and determination and now never regretting taking the plunge.

DESCRIBE A TYPICAL WORKING DAY, IF THERE IS SUCH A THING?

Not really. At the moment, lots of time is spent on the telephone, chasing, sourcing and liaising, etc. Also, I have to drive a lot to clients and suppliers...the list is endless.

WHO OR WHAT ARE YOUR INFLUENCES?

Art. architecture, nature, costume and fairy tales. I suppose the biggest influence for me regarding interior design has been costume. As a child I was fascinated by period costume. I bought *Fashion* by Mila Contini, pored over it for hours, then reproduced costumes to scale in perfect detail. This has translated into a love of the sensuality of fabrics...being in a showroom of exquisite textures definitely does it for me! I also liked being taken around stately homes as a kid—subliminal stuff.

WHAT IS YOUR OPINION OF TV INTERIOR MAKEOVER SHOWS AND THEIR EFFECT ON VIEWERS?

Very mixed. There are some really awful results with really cheap and tacky effects. Lewellyn-Bowen is good-intelligent and humorous. I think the effect on the public has been enormous... it's big business. Anyway, it's official... Verdict reported that women now spend more on home related items than clothes.

Now, the prevalent look is 1950s inspired, very chic, classic and restrained, Italian and Scandinavian designer-influenced, I like this look because it's classic in a contemporary way and will stand the test of time. I'm not into fads.

We live in a fast-moving society and I think people generally are embracing modernism, because it is a response to the simple, tasteful surroundings we need to reflect our lifestyle.

It generally reflects my style: light, airy and minimal, but I've a couple of rooms desperate for updating. At the moment, home lies a long way down the list of priorties.
